In 1974, a group of women golfers, led by LaJunta Stovall and Ruthven Vaux, decided it was time to bring competitive golf to the women of Hilton Head Island.

Seven golf courses were in operation at this time: Palmetto Dunes, Port Royal, Harbour Town, Sea Marsh, Ocean, Hilton Head Golf Club (now Shipyard) and Spanish Wells. All were extremely cooperative in agreeing to set aside tee times throughout the year for a new organization, the Hilton Head Island Women's Golf Association (HHIWGA). As new courses were developed, HHIWGA expanded with them.

Shortly thereafter, the Dr. Alligator Tournament was founded to benefit the Hilton Head Hospital Auxiliary Nurses' Scholarship program, and over \$225,000 was donated by HHIWGA over the years for this most worthwhile cause. Lowcountry Women's Golf Association (LWGA) has now taken on this charitable function to benefit the nursing programs at both Hilton Head Regional Medical Center and Beaufort Memorial Hospital.

In 1976, another group of women golfers, led by Walton Horton and Ruthven Vaux, brought the spirit of competitive golf to the women of Beaufort County north of the Broad River. Thus the Women's Golf Association of Beaufort County (WGABC) was formed. In time, WGABC admitted eligible members from all of Beaufort County.

It became evident in 2001 that the demand for membership outweighed the capacity for membership. Popular tournaments were consistently overbooked and waiting lists grew. Demographics of the area predicted an ever-increasing number of residents, lured to the area by its fine golf and pleasant temperatures. In addition, the two organizations overlapped each other, with a majority of members belonging to both groups and both organizations requesting the same golf courses. Something had to be done.

A joint committee was formed to pursue the feasibility of developing a new golf organization that would absorb growth far into the future and that would include a single countywide women's association. Working diligently, this committee developed a framework that would maintain the friendly, competitive golf experiences of both HHIWGA and WGABC. HHIWGA and WGABC dissolved their separate organizations at the end of 2002, and the Lowcountry Women's Golf Association, an organization that included all of Beaufort County, was born.

Because of the foresight and perseverance of their Founders, the members of HHIWGA and WGABC enjoyed the best in competitive golf on both sides of the Broad River for 28 years. LWGA's Yearbook includes the names of these founders, as well as all of the past champions and the former presidents of HHIWGA and WGABC, ladies who gave much time and effort to ensure that these groups were well-run, competitive, fun and friendly. Thanks are also extended to all those members who served on their Boards of Directors over the years; without them LWGA would not have come to be.

As LWGA looks to the future, our goals remain lofty, our enthusiasm evident, and our hopes high.

Johnny Adams Mixed Team Championship

Ellie O'Brien and Warren Peper claimed the 2007 Johnny Adams Mixed Team Golf Championship, held over the weekend at The Municipal Golf Course. O'Brien, who has committed to play golf at Winthrop University next season, and Peper followed their first day 65 with a steady 70 for a 2-day total of 135, nine-under par. 2006 champions Victoria Tsurutis and David Ogle gamely defended their title, finishing the tournament with 4 birdies in the final 5 holes. However, O'Brien and Peper birdied 4 out of the first 6 on the back nine to secure the championship with a closing 33, to win by 3 shots.

Bonnie and Dennis Parsons, playing out of Snee Farm Country Club in Mount Pleasant, captured the Senior Mixed Team Golf Championship. The Parsons' 35 on the final nine secured the title by 5 strokes over Martha and Wayne Wright.

Warren Peper is on a tear City Senior Championship

Charleston SC Warren Peper stormed back from 9 shots down to claim the 2007 City of Charleston Senior Men's Golf Championship at The Municipal Golf Course. Peper carded 7 birdies on his way to a final round 68, enabling him to add another Charleston City Golf Championship to his 2007 season.

Already part of the 2007 City Mixed Champion team, Peper played the final 45 holes of this 54 hole event in 4 under par. Peper credits local professional Jim Williams with an alignment tip prior to Saturday's round for the turn around. Peper, whose goal at the start of the day was be "low Muni player," defeated medalist Bubba Hightower by one stroke.

Joe McKain held off a late charge by Jim Lamm to win the 2007 Super-Senior Championship. Lamm, the defending champion, played the final nine holes in one-under par. However, McKain was able to withstand the pressure and win on the first playoff hole.

Warren Peper, teaming with son Mark Peper, won his 3rd consecutive City of Charleston Golf Championship in the 2007 Parent-Child Championship held at The Municipal Golf Course. On the heels of his Mixed Team Championship and City Senior Championship, Warren and son Mark rolled through the back 9 in 33 strokes to claim part of the three way tie in the 20-29 year-old sons division.

In the most competitive flight of the Championship, Austin and Kip Parks shot 67 to claim the 16-19 year old sons division. Four of the eleven teams in the 16-19 year old sons division shot better than par. The Parks' 5 under par round of 67 was the low round of the event from all of the 11 flights.

Shelley and Rusty Neal captured the 13-15 year old daughters division. Their 82 was the low round of the championship for all of the daughters' divisions.



A birdie putt on the third hole of sudden death sealed the victory for the Duncan native. Jackson Moore kept the family name proud on the scoreboard as he matched his older brother's win with a victory in the boy's 13-14 bracket. McKenzie Talbert won the girl's 13 and under bracket while Wesley Long was victorious in the nine hole boy's bracket.

The first round of the two day event was the Ford Parent Child Championship took place on Wednesday. The teams competed in pre-flighted divisions with a select drive alternate shot format. The Bryan family took yet another trophy home as they added to their history of Ford Picard titles. 



The intent, of course, is to help honest golfers avoid a disaster, such as hitting a wrong ball from a hazard and having it go out of bounds." Bunch, Chairman of the Bunch, Chairman of the USGA's Rules of Golf Committee. 

The SCGA was one of five associations throughout the United States and Canada who was a recipient of this award.

The SCGA, through the efforts of the South Carolina Junior Golf Association and South Carolina Junior Golf Foundation, has

supported the construction and operation of The First Tee facilities in five different locations in South Carolina: Columbia, Greenville, Myrtle Beach, Spartanburg and Sumter. Plans are also in the initial stages to create and open The First Tee facilities in Aiken, Charleston and Florence.

Rada Tabbed South Carolina Golf Association Player of the Year

COLUMBIA SC- South Carolina sophomore Patrick Rada will be named 2007 South Carolina Golf Association Player of the Year at a banquet at Columbia Country Club Saturday. In the year-long competition, Rada scored 233.8 points including victories in two tournaments and two other top-five finishes.

Rada was the SCGA Four Ball Tournament champion and claimed the title at the Carolina Golf Association Carolinas Amateur Tournament as well. He advanced to the semifinals of CGA Match Play and took fifth place in the SCGA Amateur.

For the Gamecocks this season, Rada opened the Bank of Tennessee Intercollegiate with a career-best 68 and finished 57th. He went 1-2-1 in the Callaway Golf Collegiate Match Play event, helping the Gamecocks to a fourth-place finish.

The Gamecocks return to the course in February at the John Hayt Invitational, which tees off on the 17th at Sawgrass Country Club in Ponte Verde Beach, Fla.

Women's Golf Rated 27th in the Nation

COLUMBIASC - At the end of the fall campaign, South Carolina women's golf ranks 27th in the nation in the Golfweek/Sagarin Performance Index. Sophomore Bénédicte Toumpsin is ranked 52nd in the individual standings as well. A mathematical formula that links teams and players based on common opponents based on strength of schedule and won-lost-tied record, the Performance Index gives the most objective view of the teams and individuals playing well over a set period of time.

The Gamecocks opened the season with a sixth-place finish at the Cougar Classic and closed tournament play with a seventh-place showing at the UA-Ann Rhoads Intercollegiate. Individually, Toumpsin was the team's top scorer in all four events and finished as high as fourth at the Cougar Classic. She finished the fall with a 73.67 average.

South Carolina returns to the course for spring competition on Feb. 24 at the Puerto Rico Invitational.

The December 1st issue of the Heritage Classic Foundation Rankings is the final issue of the year and the top spot at season's end is the SCJGA Player of the Year. The Heritage Classic Foundation Rankings are based on overall finishes in tournaments across South Carolina and nationwide. Points are compiled from over 100 events conducted over the past twelve months.

Ernst grabbed the lead in August from 2006 award winner, Rachel Uremovich. Thanks to two AJGA victories, Ernst finished a solid year with 1014 points, 52 ahead of her nearest competitor.

Austin is a 2010 graduate, making her eligible for the award a record three times.

He also had two Big South Players of the Year, 17 All-Big South

athletes, three individual Big South champion, six Big South Freshman of the Year winners, one Big South Scholar-Athlete of the Year and the 2007 Big South Conference Female Athlete of the Year for all sports. Ashley came to Coastal Carolina after serving as the Head Men's and Women's Golf Coach at Gardner-Webb College for the 1999-2000 season. He led the women's program at Gardner-Webb to a final national ranking of seventh in NCAA Division II and coached All-American Hannah Storey. On the men's side, Ashley led a resurgence in the program as the Bulldogs improved over 30 spots in the national rankings.
